HSBC Penguin International Coaching Academy News:

Rwanda March 2010

Rwanda's rugby players are eagerly anticipating their second Hong Kong tour in March 2011 after a historic visit to the African country by two of Scotland's top coaches. The duo's visit was organised by the HSBC Penguins Coaching Academy. The Silverbacks were put through their paces by former Scotland national coach Frank Hadden, and Scottish Rugby Union referee development manager, Colin Brett, during a week-long series of clinics.

"In the last couple of years I've coached in nearly twenty countries and I'm amazed at the capacity of rugby to grow and even thrive in the most unlikely circumstances," said Hadden. "After its well documented problems in the Nineties, Rwanda is now one of the safest and most stable countries in Africa and it was fantastic to see all these enthusiastic and talented players coming together to enjoy the rivalry and camaraderie of the best team game in the world."

Hadden and Brett also conducted sessions with U14s, U18s, and the national women's team in the first ever visit to Rwanda by elite-level rugby coaches. "Rwandan rugby has come a long way since it started about ten years ago,"

added Hadden. "I first came across the national team when the Penguins did a joint training session with them in Hong Kong last March and it's clear they've made progress over the course of the year. They're not as big as the players we have in Scotland but they're quick, with good hands, and would hold their own somewhere in the middle of our national leagues.

Colin Brett also ran an introductory referees tutorial. This course was well attended and included all the current Rwandan referees plus a number of players who were keen to improve their understanding of the game. The tutorial had classroom and practical sessions and involved all course participants behind the whistle at some stage during the course. All participants confirmed (even though a number were players and did not want to ref just yet) that the course had helped immensely with their understanding of the game, and also the finer points of refereeing.





"At the end of the week there was a sevens festival in our honour. It was fascinating watching the commitment, enthusiasm and no little skill of all the players on what was a difficult playing surface. It was full contact all the way but thankfully they reigned in the aggression on the more dangerous areas of the pitch!"

The coaching visit, by Hadden, Brett and Penguin CEO Craig Brown, capped a remarkable year for Rwandan rugby that began with the Silverbacks - named after the country's signature mountain gorillas - travelling to Hong Kong for their first ever overseas tour. They finished as Plate runners-up in the Projects Kowloon RugbyFest, a ten-a-side tournament featuring 14 teams from around the world.

South African rug by great Bob Skinstad was among the impressed spectators and immediately gave the Silverbacks an open invitation to play in the Cape Town Tens, the tournament he co-founded last year.

The Silverbacks also trained with the Penguins and the Aliens from New Zealand, while Penguins coaches put them through a first-level IRB coaching course. The team then attended the world famous Hong Kong Sevens. In addition, HKRFU director of development Ruth Mitchell organised a hugely successful kit collection, meaning the players returned home with more than 40 bin bags packed with unused team strips donated by the likes of Hong Kong Football Club, DeA Tigers and Valley.

The result of all this activity is that rugby in Rwanda is booming, with youngsters taking up the sport in impressive numbers while more and more women players are also participating.

"The Penguins Coaching Academy's visit generated huge excitement and gave the game another massive boost," said Hong Kong-born rugby enthusiast and Rwanda volunteer worker, Dave Hughes, organiser of the Silverbacks' Hong Kong tour.

"We're obviously extremely grateful to the Penguins and to Frank, Colin and Craig for their time, effort and expertise. Their trip to Rwanda and the impact they made will be remembered for a long, long time."

Hong Kong, March 2010

The Penguins spent a successful week in Hong Kong undertaking various grassroots coaching activities, and making the semi-finals of a very competitive Hong Kong 10s tournament.

Highlights included the coaching of the Rwandan national team, who were in Hong Kong for the first time and competed in the Kowloon 10s tournament. The Penguin coaches also ran an IRB Rugby Ready course for the Rwandans so they all returned home with a formal IRB Coaching certificate. It has already been confirmed that the players are putting their skills to good use and are helping the development of the game in Kigali.

Other coaching activities included sessions for local school children, and American and Japanese girls who were on an exchange trip to Hong Kong. During the coaching sessions, HSBC Rugby Ambassadors Gavin Hastings, John Kirwan, and Rory Underwood joined in with the Penguin coaches.

Portugal, May 2010

The tour coaches, often assisted by players, carried out several coaching clinics throughout the tour at a number of the local clubs for children from the ages of 8-15. These sessions where for the youngsters from the Agronomia and Belenesses clubs and the Escolinha de Rugby da Galiza children's project.

Singapore and Malaysia, November 2010

The academy had a full two week programme whilst in Singapore and Malaysia. Lead by Dean Herewini (Malaysian national coach), Neil Graham from Scotland and Tony Penn from New Zealand, the team ran a number of grass roots coaching sessions for local children. The efforts concentrated on improving skills and game understanding, but always tailored to the requirements of the local coaches. The group spent a week in Singapore where they coached teams





from 10 different schools and then a week travelling from Johor Baru to Kuala Lumpur via the east coast of Malaysia (including Pengerang, Mersing and Pahat). Whilst in Malaysia over 400 school children from 14 different schools attended the sessions with approximately 250 boys introduced to rugby. The Penguin playing squad also joined in with the academy efforts. In Singapore the team lead the coaching efforts (and joined by the South African Vipers team) at the HSBC Youth Coaching festival for over 250 local youngsters at the Padang the day before the SCC 7s started. The session concentrated on skills. In Port Dickson, Malaysia, the team ran a two hour session for 130 youngsters aged from U10 to U16. Club CEO Craig Brown confirmed this was one of the best sessions he had seen a Penguin team undertake and was a credit to the players. The players organised the session themselves and created seven different stations with all the Malaysian players moving around all locations and undertaking a different set of skills at each. The laughter and smiles on all participants told its own story!

All of the children who attended the sessions that the academy ran where presented with an HSBC Penguin Coaching Academy T-Shirt.

Coach Education 2010

In partnership with our friends at COBRA in Kuala Lumpur, the HSBC Penguin Coaching Academy ran four Coach Education courses in Malaysia in 2010. In January, a team consisting of Rob Clilverd, Simon Jones and Graham Lindsay spent a week in Kuching (Sarawak, Borneo) running the IRB level 1 course. In June Gary Henderson, Lynn Evans and Rob Clilverd spent a week in Kuala Lumpur running tutorial courses preparing the coaches for the IRB level 2 course. In October Simon Burns, Martin McTaggart and David Fraser spent a week in Sandakan (Sabah, Borneo) running the IRB level 1 course and Gary Henderson, Lynn Evans and Tony Robinson ran an IRB Level 2 course in Kuala Lumpur in November. The course in November was the first IRB Level 2 the Club has run.

Portugal, May 2010

This was the Club's third XVs tour to Portugal in our 51 years of touring the world, and included two matches and three Academy sessions. The previous XVs tours to Portugal were in 1966 and 1975. A strong touring team was selected including tour captain Marcus di Rollo (Scotland). The team was coached by Steve Hill (Director of Rugby at Richmond FC), John McKittrick (North Harbour) and Riccardo Franconi (Rugby Roma). The side was managed by Ben Dormer, with assistance from Craig Brown.

The first match was against a Lisbon Regional XV - a team built on emerging players based around Lisbon, with a couple of old hands included. In an entertaining game with plenty of action the Penguins ran out winners 34 - 17.

The second match, against Agronomia, was the highlight of that Club's 75th Anniversary celebrations, and was played in warm weather in front of a good crowd. The Penguins had eleven nationalities in the team that day (Scots, English, Irish, French, Italian, South Africans, Albanians, Portuguese, Tongans, Australians and New Zealanders)! Another open, flowing game unravelled with the hosts taking an early lead through two tries from forward exchanges. The Penguins eventually found their rhythm and stared to put together multi-phased attacks which eventually brought tries. The result was not certain until ten minutes from time when the Penguins pulled away and won by 30 points to 17.

The Team enjoyed some social time off the field, with first class hospitality throughout their stay. Amongst other activities the team enjoyed a wine tour, a beach trip, many entertaining meals, not to mention the great night life (but only on their nights off, of course!) throughout the trip. Many lifelong friends were made both within the side and with the Portuguese hosts. The tour was joined by Penguins Co-founder and Life President Alan Wright, Charity Secretary Vince Bramhall and committee member Bill Calcraft.





Singapore Cricket Club 7s November 2010 Penguins win the Ablitt Cup beating the South African Vipers in the final

The Club returned to the SCC 7s over the weekend of 5th to 7th November 2010 for the third time (the previous entries were in 1997 and 1998). The team was based on a selection of ITM cup players from New Zealand, all of whom had a range of sevens experience.

The tournament favourites were the South African Vipers. South Africa are coached by the South African National Sevens Coach, Paul Treu, and had been winners of the previous three SCC 7s tournaments. Also include in the tournament where five other national sides, including Sri Lanka, Japan, Hong Kong and Kazakhstan.

Day One, Friday 5th November - Penguins were drawn in pool A and played in the first game of the tournament against Cottesloe from Perth (Australia). As expected in their first full game together the team struggled to find their rhythm, but it was an encouraging start as it gave the team a good win.

Day Two, Saturday 6th November - The opponents on day two were Kazakhstan (the 69th country the Penguins have played in or against, or coached) and the Borneo Eagles, from Sandakan. Both teams provided physical opposition but the Penguins quickly settled into structured sevens, avoiding contact and punishing the opposition with quick use of turnover ball. The result was two more wins.

Day Three, Sunday 7th November - Heavy overnight rain saturated the playing surface. Altered tactics saw Penguins adapt best to the conditions with their pressure defence regularly paying dividends. The first game saw Penguins comfortably home against Australian side, East Arnhem. In the quarter-final Penguins came up against former champions

and form side, Ponsonby from New Zealand. In one of the most clinical games of the tournament, Penguins comprehensively outplayed their opponents and won 38 - 0, setting up a semi-final with Horowhenua-Kapiti (the New Zealand provincial team). In the semi-final our opponents scored first but the physical presence of the Penguins saw the team emerge with a comfortable 33 points to 10 victory. So the grand final was a classic encounter between the South African Vipers and the Penguins. In the first half the South Africans totally dominated possession and field position, but the Penguins' resolute defence kept the Vipers scoreless and the Penguins scored first, against the run of play, with Nalu Tuigamala



forcing his way through a gap and running 40 meters to score under the posts. The successful conversion gave the Penguins a 7 - 0 lead at half time. The second half saw the South Africans change their pattern of play using more width. This paid dividends with a converted try to level the scores within 90 seconds of the restart. The Penguins struck back with a long range converted try by David Raikuna to set up a tense final three minutes with the score favouring the Penguins at 14 - 7. After the final hooter the South Africans scored. With one of the kicks of the tournament, the conversion sailed over to tie the game and send the match into sudden death extra time.

Penguins won the toss and pressure brought an early turnover. From the resulting restart the Penguins attacked and were awarded a penalty close to the Vipers' goal posts. A quick tap saw winger David Raikuna burrow his way through two defenders to ground the ball and end the contest.

This was an absolutely tremendous win for our Club in a very prestigious and high profile tournament - regarded as the strongest Sevens tournament in the southern hemisphere, outside the HSBC Sevens Worldwide Series. Congratulations to all involved.

HSBC COBRA 10s, November 2010

Penguins win the Hui Weng Choon Trophy after beating the New Zealand Legends in the final

Arriving in Kuala Lumpur, the team was hosted by Jon Addis of HSBC at the inaugural Rugby Legends dinner as presented by the COBRA Club. All had a very pleasant evening.

Come Thursday, I I th November, the team started to get into tournament mode and the intensity in training reflected this. Some adjustments were required as the team adapted from sevens to tens.

The team coped well on the first day of the competition (Saturday, I3th), running up two comfortable victories before facing Ponsonby in one of the feature matches of the day. Defence led the way again, as it had in Singapore, and the team ran out I2 - 0 winners.

Day two dawned hot and sunny. First up was the Australian team from Canberra, Gungahlin Eagles. The match was fairly even for the first five minutes, but eventually the Penguins found the gaps and the tries started to come and the Penguins moved on to the cup semi-final.

The Natal Duikers had a big side with plenty of representative players in their ranks. Penguins prepared for a very physical encounter, but, in the performance of the weekend, the Penguins were just too good with ball in hand - especially with support play keeping movement after movement alive. Penguins had the game won by half-time, leading 38 - 0 at the break. In the second half the Penguins conserved energy by placing emphasis on their defensive strategies. The final score was 43 - 0.

So much for the factor 30 sun block - a massive thunder storm enveloped the stadium at the start of the Bowl Final and put a halt to proceedings for about 45 minutes. This left the pitch wet and muddy in parts although it did hold together reasonably well until the end of play.

From the start of the tournament most spectators had predicted a New Zealand Legends/Penguin International final, and that's exactly what happened. Penguins started well and took a 14 - 0 lead into the break. In a rare defensive lapse the New Zealand Legends scored soon after the resumption. However, sustained Penguins pressure saw vice-captain





Nathan Hohaia score to put the final beyond reach. The victory was based on sound defence with the side conceding only twelve points throughought the entire tournament. Coach McIntosh was outstanding in this aspect and was assisted by John McKittrick.

A fourth COBRA 10s title for the Penguins and a brilliant end to a great two week tour. To win both tournaments was a tremendous achievement and will be remembered by all in the Club for a very long time.
