Bologna Tour Report Italy 21 to 25 May 2025

We have great contacts in Italy – The Penguini as they are affectionately known. So organising a tour to Italy was aways on our must do list.



Thanks to Carlo Casagrande for the contact and Francesco Paolini the President of Bologna Rugby for readily accepting the challenge. In true Penguini fashion we had nothing to worry about.



Penguin CEO Craig Brown set about assembling the management team with experienced Penguins Steve Hill and Sandra Soler-Gomez heading up the respective teams.

Dates confirmed, hotel book and the next challenge was to select the players.

Most of the tour party landed in Bologna on Wednesday and we had a muster that evening including heading to the Bologna Rugby club for a welcome dinner.

It was great to see the four King Penguins on tour and they were busy meeting the locals and also

preparing for their prison coaching visit on Thursday.

Thursday morning and things began to orientate toward the reason we were here – we have games of rugby to play. Great to see all players up and ready to go for training one.





Craig Brown led the team briefing meeting where health & safety, medical, logistics, hotel, kit, meals, behaviour, and schedule details were discussed.

Some early awards were handed out as well, including youngest on tour per team (dead heat in the men's team so a first with 2), the infamous Mr Freeze hat (Calum was first up) and Sandra's Penguins!


Our schedule was training Thursday morning and then again in the afternoon. Our last training session was Friday morning. The entire tour party had Friday afternoon off and were free to tour our local environment. Next muster was Sat breakfast.

Three sharp and to the point training sessions behind us and we were ready for the matches on Saturday. The run schedule was the Rockhoppers, followed by a local U18 fixture then the Men's.

On Saturday morning two special Penguins arrived at the hotel to present the respective squad jerseys. Abby Moonbeam-Brown presented the Rockhoppers jerseys. Abby was the first female academy coach for the Penguins specialising in sessions for the younger children. She run session as part of our coaching work in partnership with HSBC and coached alongside legends such as Lawrence Dallaglio, John Kirwan and Jonah Lomu. Stuart Buchanan-Smith presented the jerseys to the Men's team. Stuart played for the Penguins in the mid 1990s including the tour to the COBRA Tens in 1995.



Rockhoppers Match Summary



The Penguins came out flying, setting the tone early with a dazzling team effort that saw Evie Tonkin slice through the defence for a well-earned opening try. But the Rockhoppers weren't just ready, they were relentless. Their fluid handling, creative flair, and lightning-fast support play saw them rack up five sensational tries in just 25 minutes, turning the first quarter into a showcase of attacking brilliance.

Yet the home side showed heart. Undeterred by the scoreboard, they stuck to their game plan with some thunderous carries off the breakdown and slick offloads in the tightest of channels. Their

persistence paid off and cheered on by a roar from the crowd they crashed over the line following a gritty series of pick-and-go drives along the right hand side.

As the second half unfolded, the Rockhoppers extended their lead with clinical precision. In a great display of sportsmanship, they loaned players to bolster the depleted local side, who were down to just three subs. The final quarter brought renewed fire from Bologna, who began dominating the scrums and even drove the Rockhoppers backwards on occasion, shifting momentum and igniting the crowd once more.

The locals came tantalizingly close to a second try with a thrilling surge toward the line, but the Rockhoppers' disciplined defence held firm.

Men's Match Summary

As is the case on most tours the standard of the opposition to be played was very unknown. Rumours of them being under strength abounded in the lead up to the match. However, like most rumours these were very unfounded. Bologna RFC, strengthened by a number of players from local rivals Colorno RFC, proved to be a real handful and the Penguins were truly tested in the first forty minutes of the game. The Italians were strong in the scrum and competed feverishly at the breakdown. The Penguins conceded the first score of the game after a strong attack from the hosts and knew from the off they were in for a good battle. As the first half progressed the Penguins began to find their rhythm and a couple of excellent scores took the visitors ahead. However the first half ended all square at 12-12.

A host of substitutions for the Penguins at half time took a while to bed in. Eventually the stronger skill set and better discipline of the Penguins began to break down the home team's defences, particularly in the driving maul and out wide on the wings. In the last twenty minutes the Penguins finally appeared to have run off the excesses of previous evenings and went on to secure a 33-17 win. The whole squad, led superbly by fly half

Alex Seers, contributed to a very hard fought win and should be congratulated on a fine display against a very tough and determined opposition.

Prison Visit

The Bologna Rugby club are active in a community program supporting rugby players in Dozza Prison which is about 2km from the club. The program aims to help the physical, social and educational recovery of in-mates and troubled youth through playing rugby. The program started in 2014 and is funded by local companies such as Marconi, Emil Banca and Faac. About 40 prisoners are in the program, support is provided through regular coaching sessions and they play in the local level 3 league. Of course all games are at home with the visiting teams going into the heart if the prison where the field is. The team is called Gial-lo Dozza – referring to the yellow card used in rugby – if you have done wrong you are given time to think about

what you have done before returning to the action. Most of the players have never played rugby when they enter the program but soon get into the action.

A number of them, on release, join Bologna Rugby Club and enjoy a ready-made local family and support unit.

Thanks to the Penguin coaches Steve Hill, Sandra Soler-Gomez, Gary Coulthard, Pierre Azapoldi, Matt Price and Derek Robb who went through the 15 big steel doors to get to the centre of the prison and the playing field.

This is our second visit to the Dozza Prison following our first visit in 2019.





